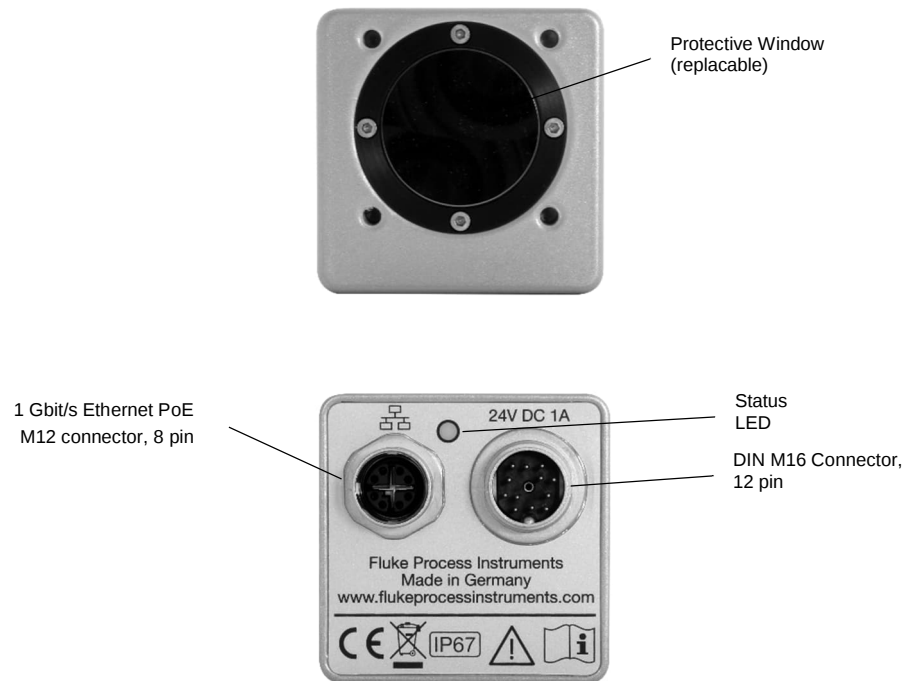

The integrated I/O is standard with every SA camera and provides a simple, easy to install solution for factory automation and process applications. For added flexibility, the imager can interface directly to external I/O modules for more demanding applications. For even simpler and more direct communications with factory automation systems, the TV30 SA models offer fieldbus flexibility including OPC UA and MQTT communications.

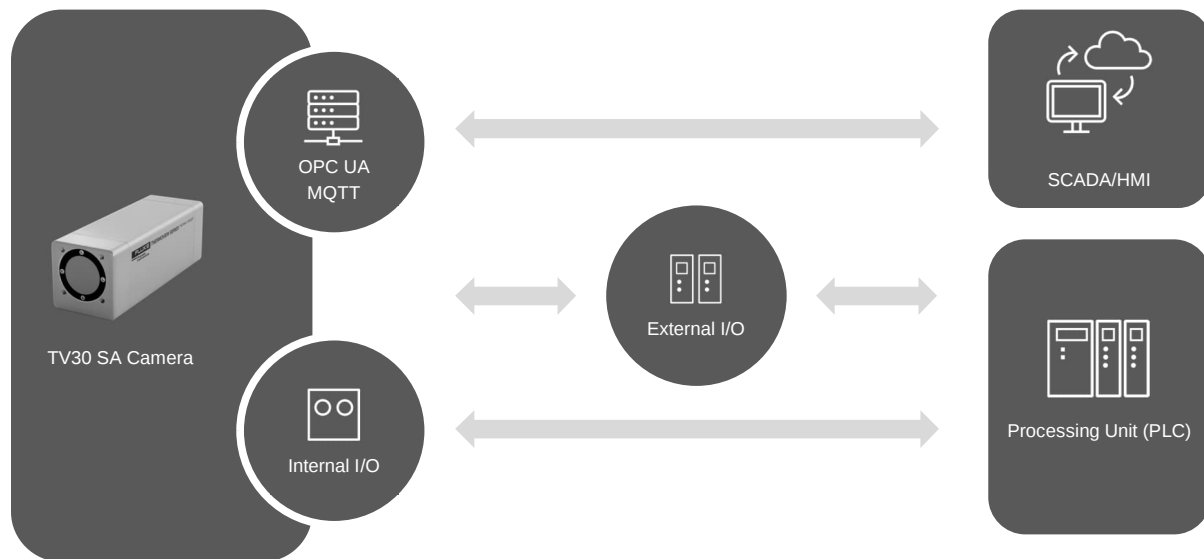

2.2 Optical Specifications

The following optical specification is based on the theoretical calculated spot size derived on the pitch of the camera detector array and the lens focal length. The Instantaneous Field of View (IFOV) specifies the size of the image of an individual detector element in the object plane assuming ideal imaging optics. Typically, for accurate temperature measurements, the target area needs to be larger than that determined by the calculated theoretical IFOV. That target area is stated by the Measurement Field of View (MFOV), which corresponds to an area of 3 x 3 pixels.

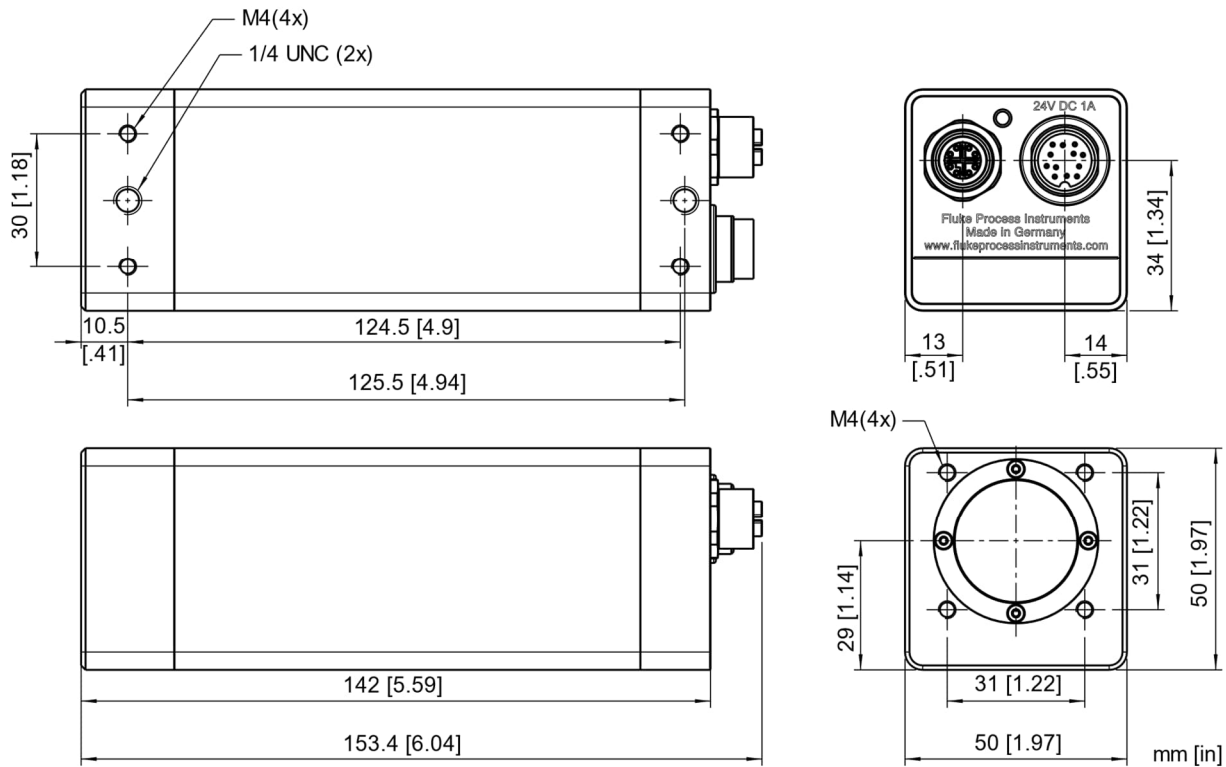

3 Basics

3.1 Measurement of Infrared Temperature

All surfaces emit infrared radiation. The intensity of this infrared radiation changes according to the temperature of the object. Depending on the material and surface properties, the emitted radiation lies in a wavelength spectrum of approximately 1 to 20 μm . The intensity of the infrared radiation (heat radiation) is dependent on the material. For many substances, this material-dependent constant is known. This constant is referred to as the emissivity value.

Infrared cameras are optical-electronic sensors. These sensors are sensitive to the emitted radiation. Infrared cameras consist of a lens, spectral filter, sensor array, and an electronic signal processing unit. The task of the spectral filter is to select the wavelength spectrum of interest. The sensor converts the infrared radiation into an electrical signal. The connected electronics processes this signal for further analysis. The intensity of the emitted infrared radiation is thereby used to determine the temperature of the target. Since the intensity of the infrared radiation is dependent on the material, the appropriate emissivity can be selected on the sensor.

The biggest advantage of the infrared camera is its capability for the contactless determination of target surface temperatures. Consequently, surface temperatures of moving or hard to reach objects can be easily measured.

3.2 Emissivity of Target Object

To determine the emissivity of the target object, see section 10.4 [Typical Emissivity Values](#), page 93. If emissivity is low, measured results could be falsified by interfering infrared radiation from background objects (such as heating systems, flames, fireclay bricks, etc. located close beside or behind the target object). This type of problem can occur when measuring reflective surfaces and very thin materials, such as plastic film and glass.

This measurement error can be reduced to a minimum, if care is taken during installation and the camera is shielded from these reflecting radiation sources.

4 Environment

4.1 Ambient Temperature

Without water cooling, the TV30 camera is designed for ambient operating temperatures between -10 to 50°C (14 to 122°F). With water cooling equipment, it can be used in environments at higher temperatures.

By forcing water circulation, it is possible to maintain cooled internal housing temperatures. It helps to verify the flow capacity needed and cooling water temperature before proceeding with the installation. It is also necessary to verify the environmental temperature and install the housing at the correct distance from the heating source.

Note that too cold water can cause condensation, which can lead to damage in the device, see section 10.2 [Avoidance of Condensation](#), page 92.

4.2 Atmospheric Quality

If the lens gets dirty, infrared energy will be blocked and the instrument will not measure accurately. It is good practice to always keep the lens clean. The air purge collar accessory helps keep contaminants from building up on the lens, see section 8.2.2 [Air Purge Collar \(A-TV30-AP\)](#), page 74. If you use air purging, make sure a filtered air supply with clean, dry air at the correct air pressure is installed before proceeding with the installation.

4.3 Protection

The TV30 camera complies with the international protection standard IP67.

Note that effectiveness against splashing under IP67 is possible only if terminal caps are in place and all external connectors are connected and comply to IP67 too. To retain the given IP67 protection class, please inspect periodically all seals of the waterproof connectors and end caps.

4.4 Electrical Interference

To minimize electrical or electromagnetic interference or noise, please be aware of the following:

- Mount the instrument as far away as possible from potential sources of electrical interference, such as motorized equipment, which can produce large step load changes.
- Use shielded wire for all input and output connections.
- For additional protection, use conduit for the external connections. Solid conduit is better than flexible conduit in high-noise environments.
- To avoid ground loops, make sure that only ONE POINT is earth grounded, either at the instrument or at the power supply.

Note

When installing the TV30 camera, check for any high-intensity discharge lamps or heaters that may be in the field of view (either background or reflected on a shiny target)! Reflected heat sources can cause a sensor to give erroneous readings.

5 Installation



Risk of Personal Injury

When this instrument is being used in a critical process that could cause property damage and personal injury, the user should provide a redundant device or system that will initiate a safe process shutdown in the event that this instrument should fail.

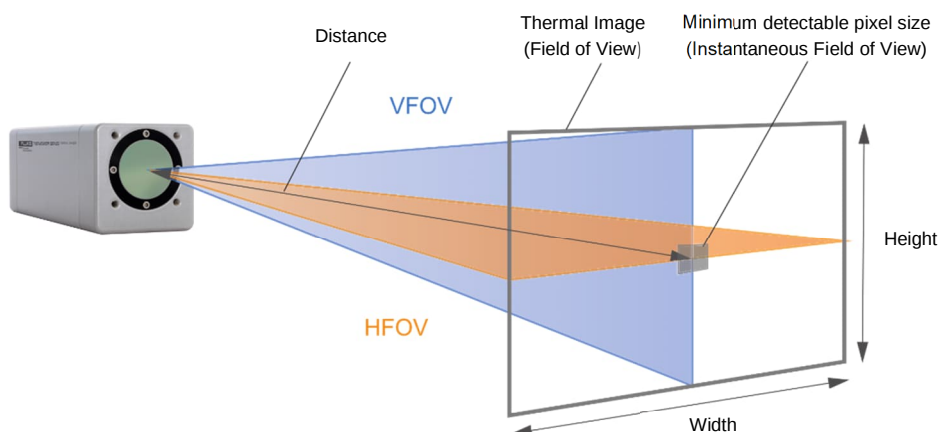
5.1 Positioning

Sensor location depends on the application. Before deciding on a location, you need to be aware of the ambient temperature of the location, the atmospheric quality of the location, and the possible electromagnetic interference in that location. If you plan to use air purging, you need to have an air connection available. Wiring and conduit runs must be considered, including computer wiring and connections, if used.

5.2 Distance to Object

The camera provides different lens models to accommodate a wide range of applications. Each individual lens provides different thermal images (Field of View) and minimum detectable pixel sizes (Instantaneous Field of View). The optical diagram below shows the principal graphical representation for measuring distance over the field of view. The manufacturer provides a tool for calculating image sizes, see section 10.1 [Field of View Calculator](#), page 91.

5.3 Focusing

After the camera has been mounted, it is important to make sure that the optimum focus has been established for the given mounting distance. It is important to focus the camera correctly to obtain the sharpest image of the target you wish to view. The motorized focus of the TV30 camera can be set via the built-in web server application.

If the installation distance changes later, it must be ensured that the focus distance is adjusted accordingly.

5.4 Mounting

The camera installation requires the most planning effort. The camera needs to be accurately mounted in relationship to the target. Adjustments to align the camera with the target may have to be designed into the camera

mounting to provide the required alignment accuracy. Avoiding or removing physical mounting limitations and obstructions in the camera's optical path, may also be required.

5.5 Powering

5.5.1 Power over External Supply

In case the camera is not supplied with power via Ethernet PoE, power can also be supplied using the 12-wire cable. Follow the steps below:

- Connect the 12-wire connector to the camera
- Tighten the outer nut of the female connector
- Wire the open pig tail ends to the terminal of the external power supply. Take care about the right polarity. For power, connect the **black** wire to Ground (-) and the **red** wire to +VDC.

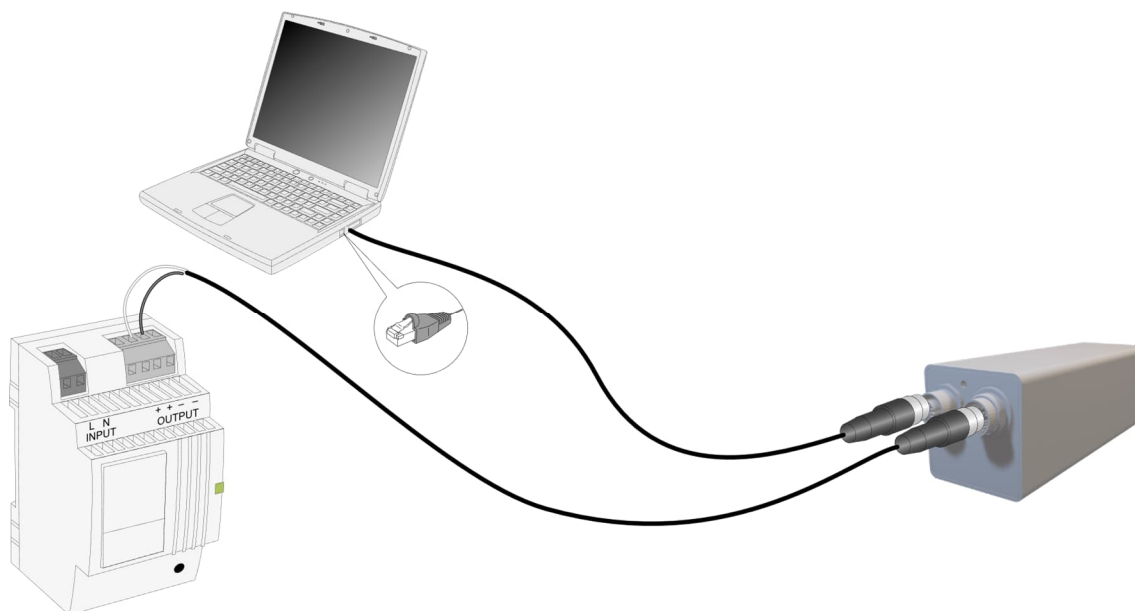

The cable shield can be used to connect it to earth ground!

The external power supply should be 24 VDC in a range of $\pm 20\%$!

Figure 5-2: Principal Cabling of Power Supply and Ethernet



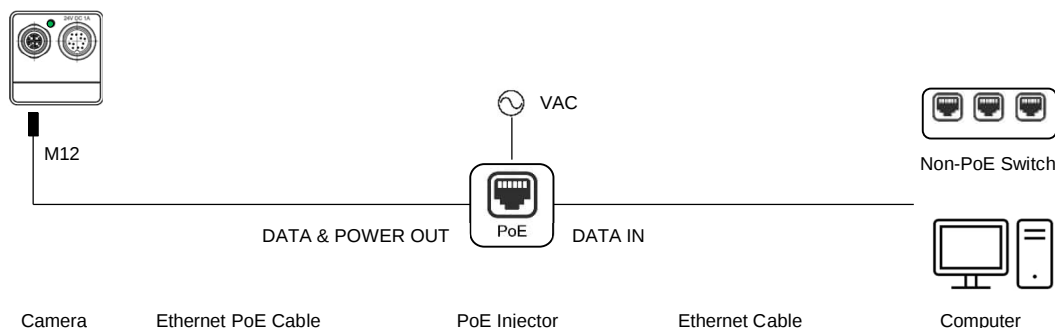

5.5.2 Power over Ethernet

The camera is supplied with power via the PoE (Power over Ethernet) following the IEEE 802.3at standard. PoE allows a single cable to provide both data connection and electric power to the sensor. The following figure shows exemplarily the connection to a computer or a non-PoE switch.

5.6 Networking

To configure the camera, connect the device directly to a PC or Laptop. To display temperature information and to setup the imager, the TV30 camera is equipped with an onboard web server, see section 7 [Web Server](#), page 34. The number of cameras in a network is only limited by the network performance (required frames per second fps). This means the need to consider the speed capability for transmitting the data and the performance of the master (e.g., a PLC) for processing all data. For example, it would be possible to network multiple cameras at a reduced frame rate of 1 fps for each.

Since Ethernet ports on a computer are (almost) never PoE capable, you will require a suitable PoE injector.

The network connection can be made in two ways:

- Connect the camera directly to a suitable PoE capable switch that is connected to the master device (e.g. your PC/Laptop)
- Connect the camera via a suitable PoE injector to a non-PoE capable switch that is connected to the master device (e.g. your PC/Laptop)

The following methods are available for assigning an IP address to the camera:

- Static IP address (camera's factory default)
- DHCP
- Auto IP
- mDNS

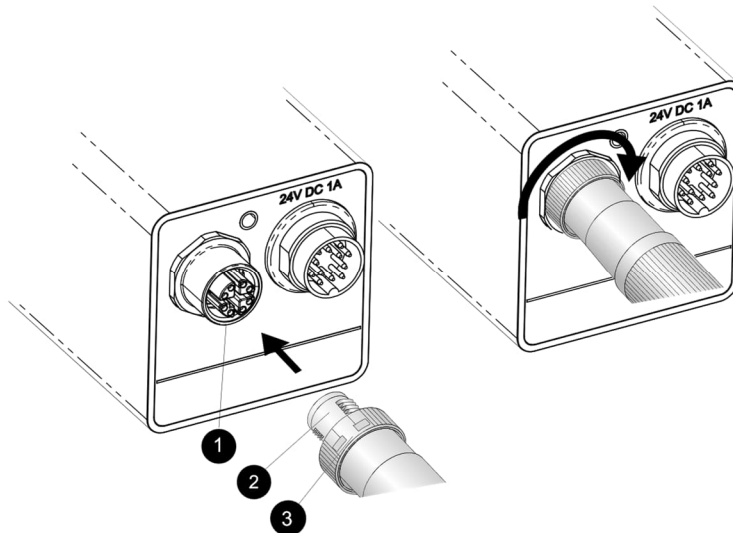

5.6.1 Ethernet Connector

To connect the Ethernet M12 cable, follow the steps below:

- Remove the rear metal sealed connector cap for the M12 connector at the rear side of the camera body.
- Attach the male M12 cable plug (2) straight into the female terminal (1) by turning the outer mounting thread (3) in clockwise direction.
- Attach the RJ45 connector at the other end of the cable to the related device, like Ethernet switch, Ethernet PoE switch, computer, or fiber optic converter.

Figure 5-5: DIN Connector Pin Layout (pin side on camera)

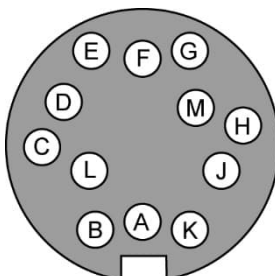

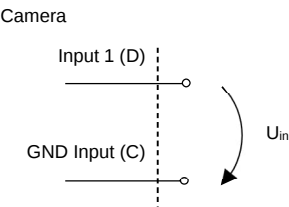

5.7.2 Digital Inputs

The TV30 SA camera provides 3 digital inputs which can be used as switch to initiate different tasks, see section 7.4.1 [Internal](#), page 48.

A high signal requires voltages of 4.5 - 24 V. A low signal is detected for voltages below 2 V.

5.7.3 Digital Outputs

The TV30 SA camera provides 3 digital outputs which can be used to indicate different tasks, see section 7.4.1 [Internal](#), page 48.

The signal output can be done in a specific mode. The desired mode can be set via the user and always applies to all outputs. The following modes are available:

- Pull-Up – the pull-up resistor is provided internally. The logical high level is fixed to +5 VDC.
- Open-Drain – requires the provision of an external pull-up resistor and a voltage supply. The logical high level is determined by the external voltage supply and not limited to +5 VDC.

Figure 5-7: Digital Output using Pull-Up

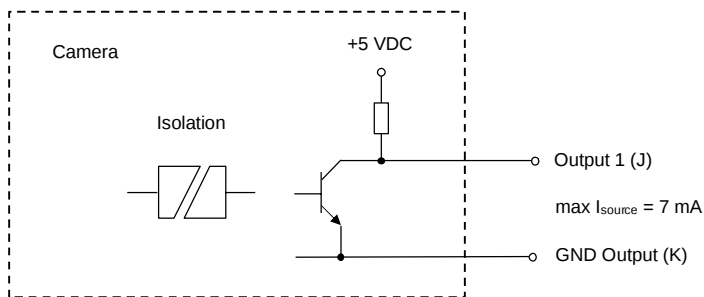
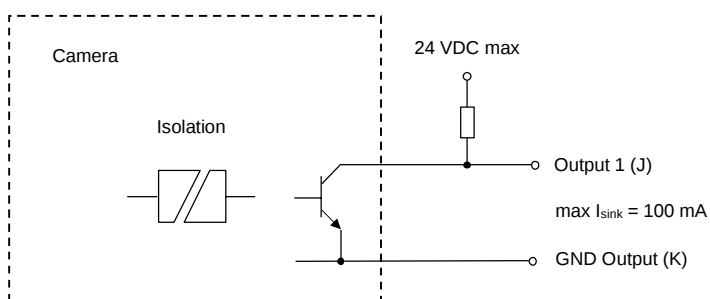


Figure 5-8: Digital Output using Open-Drain

To improve the signal quality and reducing the distortion caused due to line reflections, the line on the receiver side can be terminated with a Schottky diode to limit possible over- and undershoots.

6 Operation

6.1 Getting Started

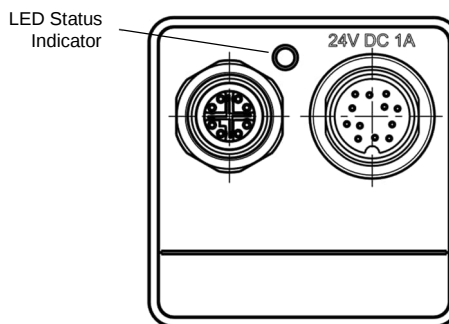
Find below the first basic steps to work with the camera:

1. **Powering**
Supply power to the camera either via Power over Ethernet (PoE) or directly via the 12-wire connector on the back of the housing, see section 5.5 [Powering](#), page 27.
2. **Green LED**
After applying voltage, the camera is in the warm-up phase, the status indicator on the back of the camera housing is red. After a few seconds, the LED must turn to solid green. A blinking or other colors indicate an error, see section 6.2 [LED Status Indicator](#), page 32.
3. **Networking**
To establish the communication, you need to know the IP address of the camera. In the factory default setting, the camera comes in the static IP address mode and the address preset to **192.168.42.132**
4. **Communicating**
Open a standard web browser on a computer. Type the camera's IP address in the address line of the browser. After the communication has been successfully established, the home page of the camera's internal website appears with the login information. The following credentials are given with factory default.
Username: **admin**
Password: **admin**
5. **Configuring**
For an object area that is to be analyzed in particular, you can generate an AOI value following a specific measurement function (Min, Max, Avg), see section 7.2.1 [<Camera> <Values>](#), page 35.

6.2 LED Status Indicator

The TV30 camera has a built-in multi-color LED in the rear panel, which indicates the current health and alarm status.

Figure 6-1: LED Status Indicator



The LED patterns are:

1. Blinking yellow – booting and warming-up
2. Solid green – no errors, IP address obtained, and Ethernet cable connected
3. Blinking red – various errors
4. Blinking green – flash memory being updated
5. Solid blue – shutter closed
6. Solid red – over ambient temperature

Please note that the camera displays these patterns in a priority order, higher numbered events mask lower numbered events. So, for example, the camera is connected to Ethernet (solid green) but have an over-temperature condition. In that case, the LED displays a solid red until the over-temp condition is cleared, then the LED would display solid green.

6.3 Shutter

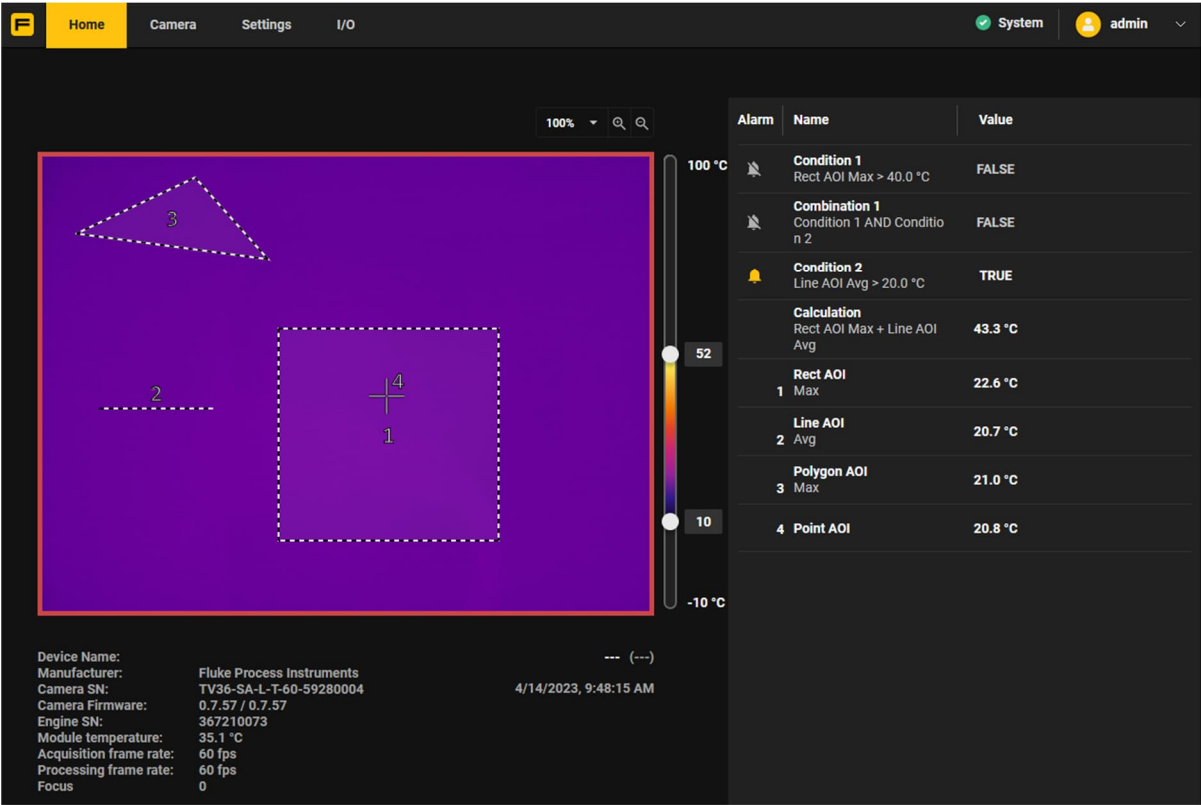
The camera is equipped with an internal lens shutter. The shutter closes automatically required for a reference recalibration to improve camera performance. It is not a substitute for a factory blackbody calibration. With the shutter closed, no temperature measurements are taking place. 7 Web Server

Several information of the camera is available and will be displayed using a standard web browser. Furthermore, several settings can be initiated and transferred to the imager. It is possible to display or set the device IP address, to modify the focus of the infrared camera or to upload a new firmware.

7.1 Home Page

The Home page summarizes all relevant information at runtime at a glance.

The current thermal image is shown as well as a list of all defined conditions, AOI's (area of interest) and their current results. A red frame around the thermal image indicates an alarm condition.

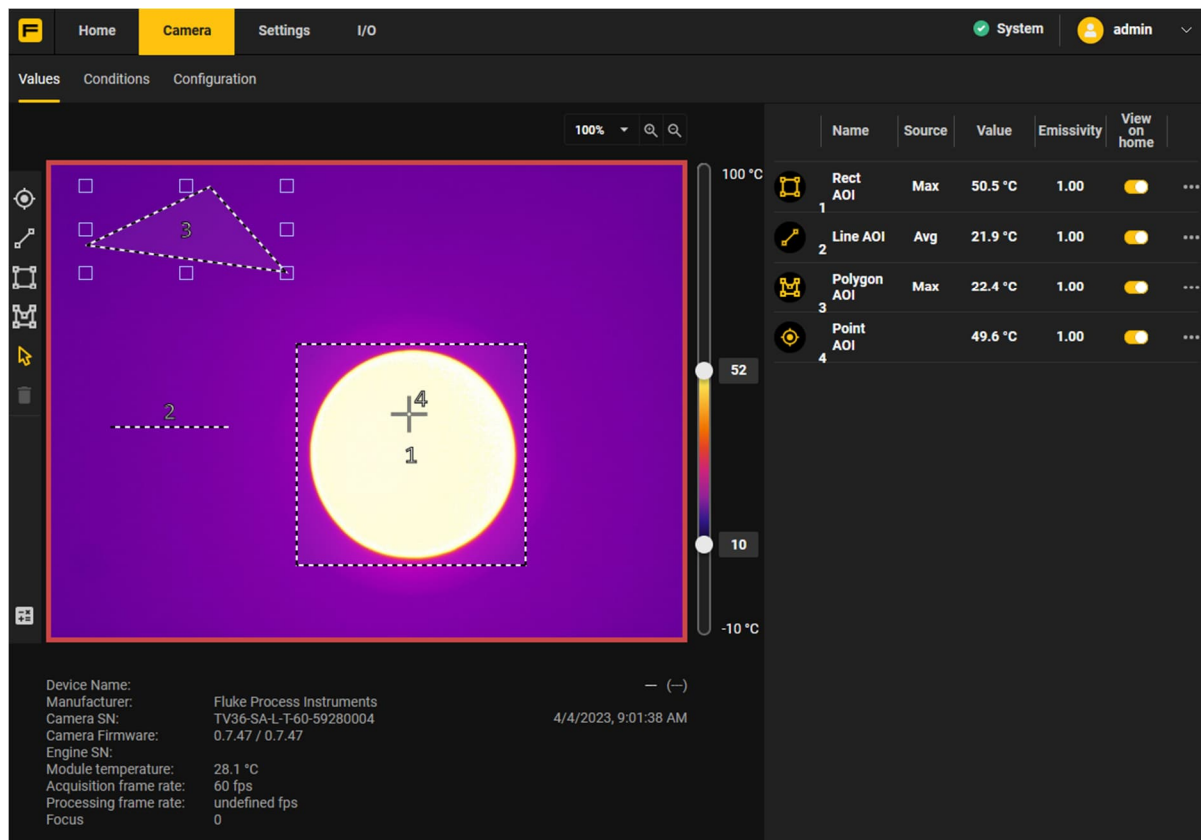
Information regarding important camera data is shown in the lower left corner such as manufacturer, serial number, firmware revision number, internal module temperature, frame rate, and others.

The Home page is for display purposes only. It is the only page that is visible for a viewer user. Configurations must be made in advance by an administrator or developer under the Camera page.

7.2 Camera Pages

7.2.1 <Camera> <Values>

The camera uses analysis objects to present thermal information contained in an infrared image called AOI's (area of interest). An AOI can be built using one of the tools on the left side of the page:

- Points (spots)
- Lines
- Rectangles
- Polygons

An AOI is involved in the temperature calculation for all pixels which belong to the AOI area. Every AOI can have its own emissivity and selectable math sources to calculate an AOI result. An AOI result is displayed as Value under the corresponding column.

More than one mathematical source can be activated simultaneously for an AOI. In the overview list, an AOI with multiple mathematical sources is listed in multiple lines, but under the same name and the identical numerical index.

Selecting View on Home will show the AOI values on the Home page so that during runtime the values are visible for viewer users as well.

Clicking on the three dots at the end of the line opens the properties dialog for the desired AOI.

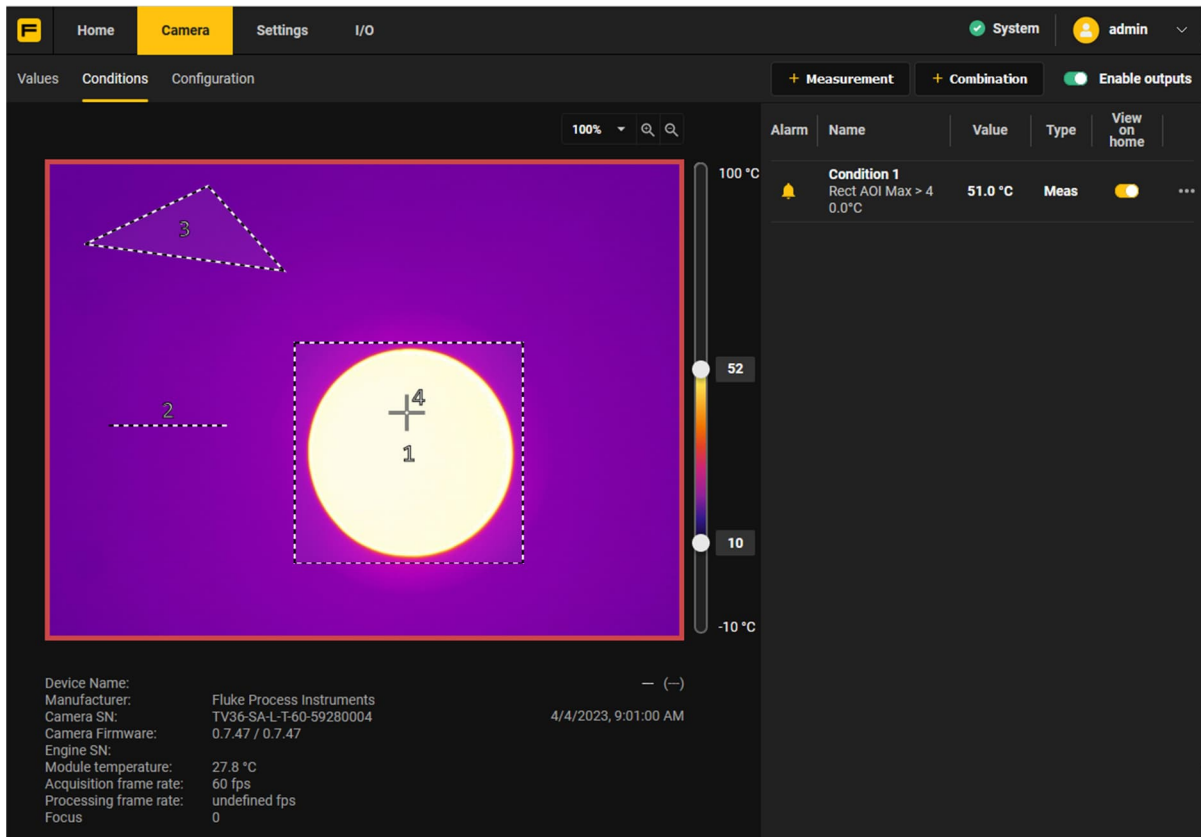

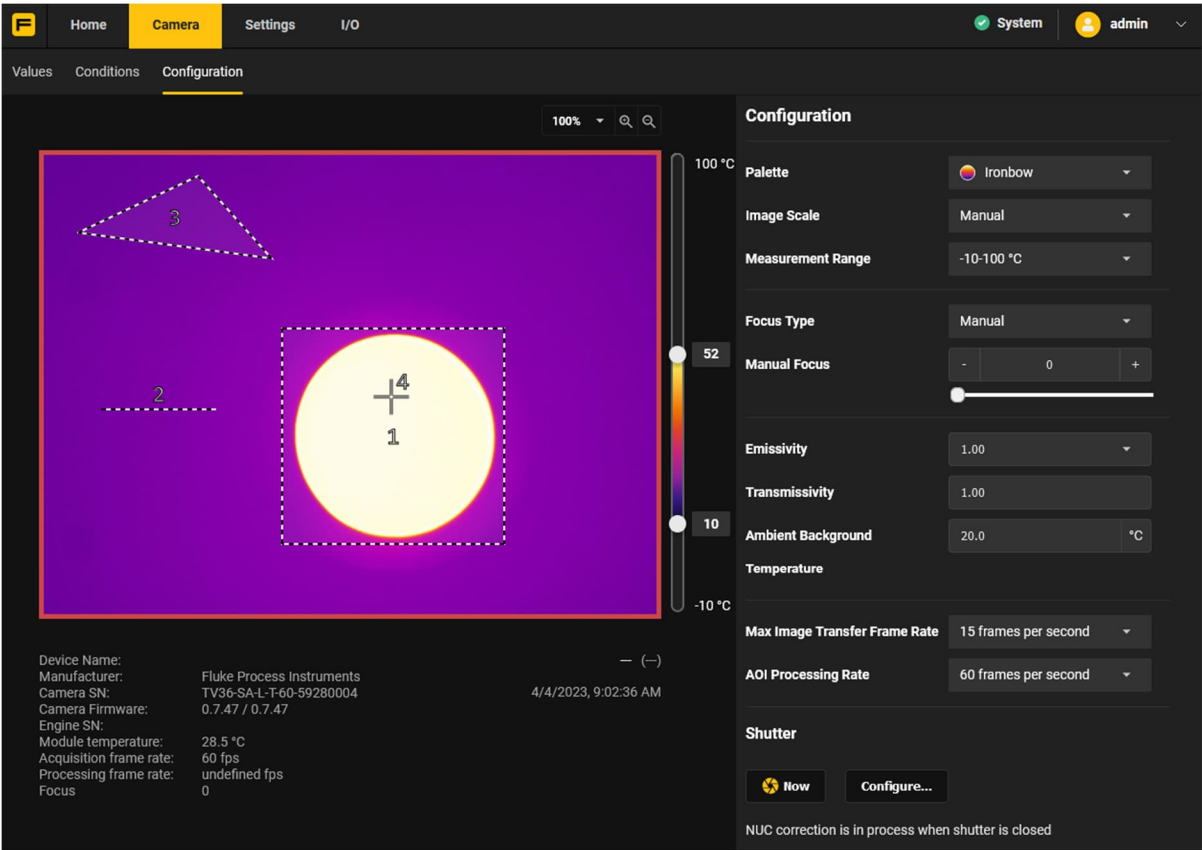

Palette and Measurement Range

In infrared images color of every pixel depends on its temperature. The TV30 camera has means to adjust this dependency to make visual appearance of the image better and to intensify important details. To set relation between colors and temperature you need to select color palette and define temperature range.

- Palette

Selects one of the predefined color palettes.

Pixels with temperatures below the lower range limit are shown with the bottom palette color. Pixels with temperatures above the upper range limit are shown with the top palette color. Pixels with temperatures in between have corresponding intermediate palette colors.
- Image Scale

<Auto> the camera calculates the temperature range automatically to make all temperatures present on the image.

<Manual> sets the temperature range limits manually by using the sliders just to the right of the thermal image. A manual setting is useful when not all temperatures are of interest, but the image needs a dedicated sub-range.
- Measurement Range

Switches between the measurement sub-ranges of the camera

Focus

The camera is equipped with a motorized focus. The focus setting is controlled by Autofocus Type.

Autofocus Type	<AOI> focus setting is applied to an exclusive AOI <Full Image> focus setting is applied to the whole infrared image <Manual> focus setting is controlled manually
Manual Focus	Allows to drive motorized focus position by hand if Autofocus Type is set to <Manual>. Displayed focus position number has no physical meaning.

Measurement Calculation

Emissivity	changes the global emissivity. The global emissivity is used to correct the temperature reading of the target. The target may read lower than its true temperature, due to the target emissivity being less than 1.
Transmissivity	there could be something in the optical path, such as a window that absorbs a percentage of the infrared radiation before it gets to the camera. The transmission value is an adequate correction factor to compensate that effect.
Ambient Background Temperature	compensates the ambient background temperature of the surrounding area that might be in the field of view. When the target's emissivity is less than 1, the background temperature can interfere with measurement accuracy. The error is reduced by accurately setting the background temperature. Sometimes it is not possible to completely reduce background induced errors because there could be various background objects of different temperatures reflecting off the target. The best way to minimize these errors is to shield the target as best as possible from stray radiation paths.

Frame Rate

Max Image Transfer Frame Rate	The rate at which image data will be updated on the webserver. Rate can be reduced to save bandwidth.
AOI Processing Rate	changes the processing frame rate for all AOI's to the desired speed.

Shutter

The camera needs to run non-uniformity correction (NUC) procedure from time to time to maintain accurate temperature measurements. For performing this, the camera is equipped with an internal lens shutter. When it is the time to run NUC, shutter closes the detector's field of view and NUC coefficients are recalculated which may take several seconds. When the shutter is closed, the camera does not measure temperatures of the scene and the measurement device is on hold. It is necessary to ensure that NUC is not blocking the camera use when temperature measurement is running, especially when object is in view for a short period of time.

7.3.2.1 Obtain IP Address via DHCP / Auto IP

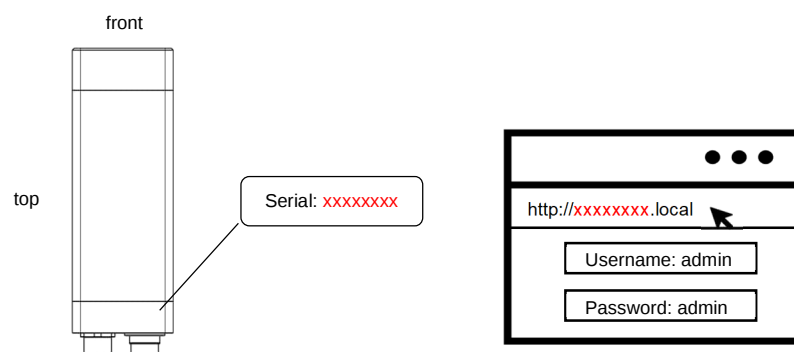

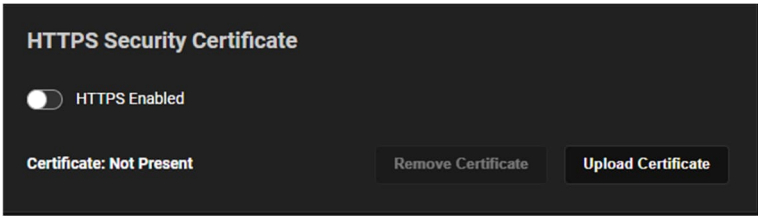

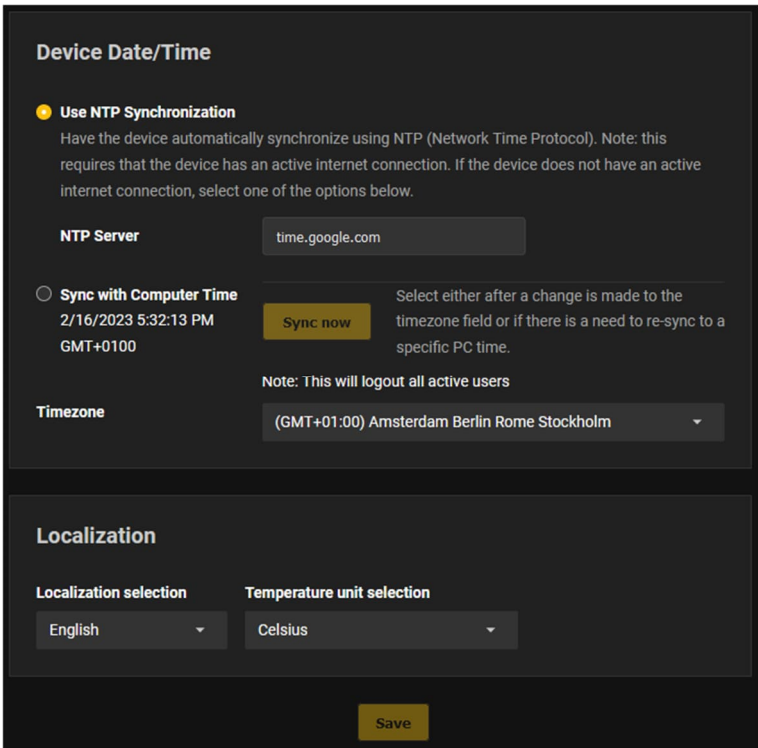

7.4.3 <I/O> <MQTT>

MQTT is a communication protocol in a server-client architecture. After the connection is established, the TV30 camera as a publisher (MQTT client) sends messages to the broker (MQTT server). A message always consists of the message content and a topic. A topic is used to classify this message in relation to other messages. The subscriber (MQTT client) can now request this topic, whereupon the broker forwards the received message to the subscriber. Subscribed topics can be used to change selected camera settings.

TV30 MQTT messages are sent with the quality of service "At most once". That means the message is sent once and may not arrive if the connection is interrupted.

Figure 7-18: Principle of MQTT Network Protocol

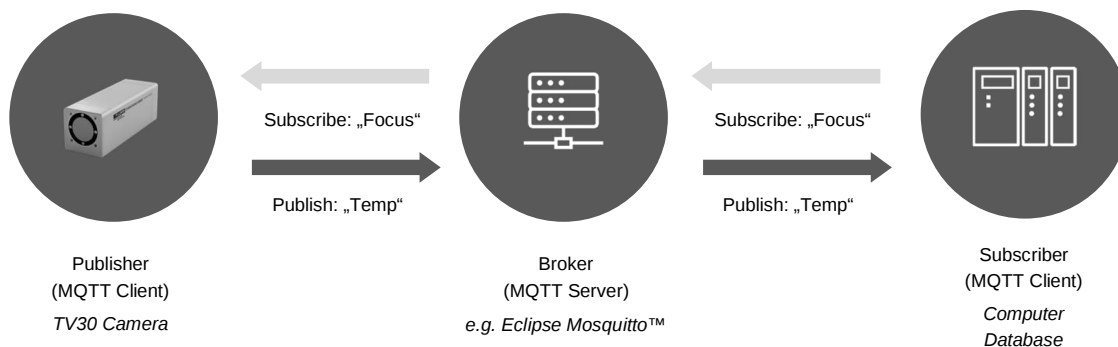


Figure 7-19: MQTT

Figure 7-20: Principle of OPC UA Network

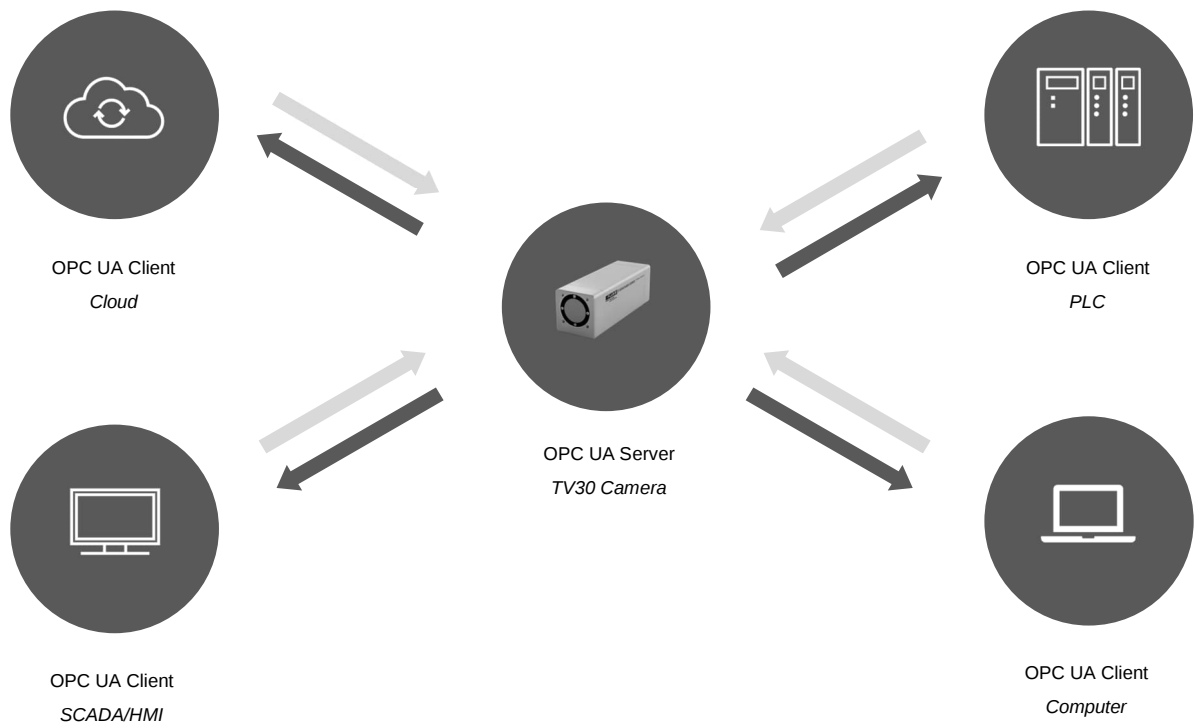
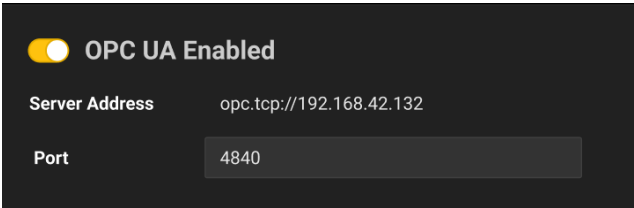


Figure 7-21: OPC UA

8.1.1 Ethernet PoE Cable (A-CB-xx-M12-W08-xx)

The Ethernet PoE cable comes with an eight-pin male M12 connector, assigned to the camera's rear eight-socket female M12 connector. The corresponding end of the Ethernet PoE cable is equipped with a general RJ45 snap-in connector. The cable is about 7 mm (0.3 in) in outer diameter.

The LT version of the cable withstands ambient temperatures up to 80°C (176°F), the HT version withstands ambient temperatures up to 165°C (329°F).

In case of using PoE (Power over Ethernet) to supply the imager with power, the needed power is injected over the existing data wires.

Figure 8-1: Exemplary Ethernet PoE LT Cable

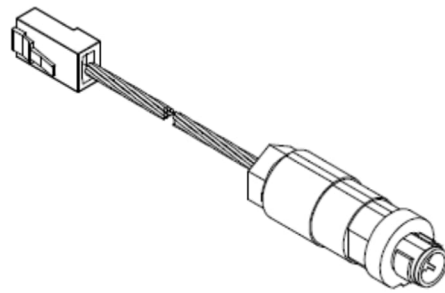


Figure 8-2: Pin Assignment (Front View)

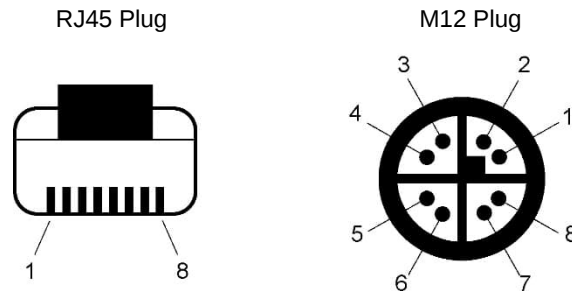

8.1.2 12-Wire Cable, High Temp (A-CB-HT-M16-W12-xx)

The cable described below is a shielded 12-conductor cable, made of two twisted pairs plus 8 separate wires, all as tinned copper braid. The cable is equipped with a M16 DIN connector on one side and wire sleeves at the counter side. The outer diameter of the cable is 7 mm (0.28 in).

The cable withstands ambient temperatures up to 200°C (392°F) and is Teflon coated. Teflon coated temperature cables have good to excellent resistance to oxidation, heat, weather, sun, ozone, flame, water, acid, alkalis, and alcohol, but poor resistance to gasoline, kerosene, and degreaser solvents.

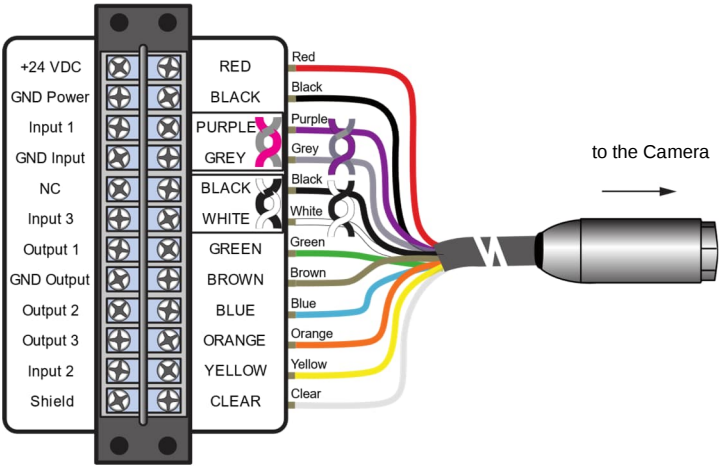

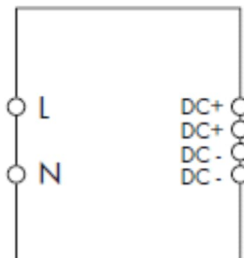

Figure 8-9: Mounting Base

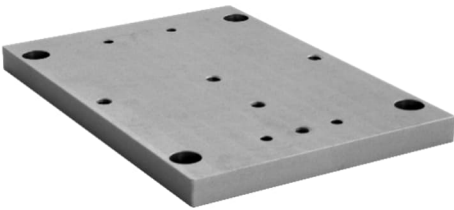


Figure 8-10: Mounting Base Dimensions

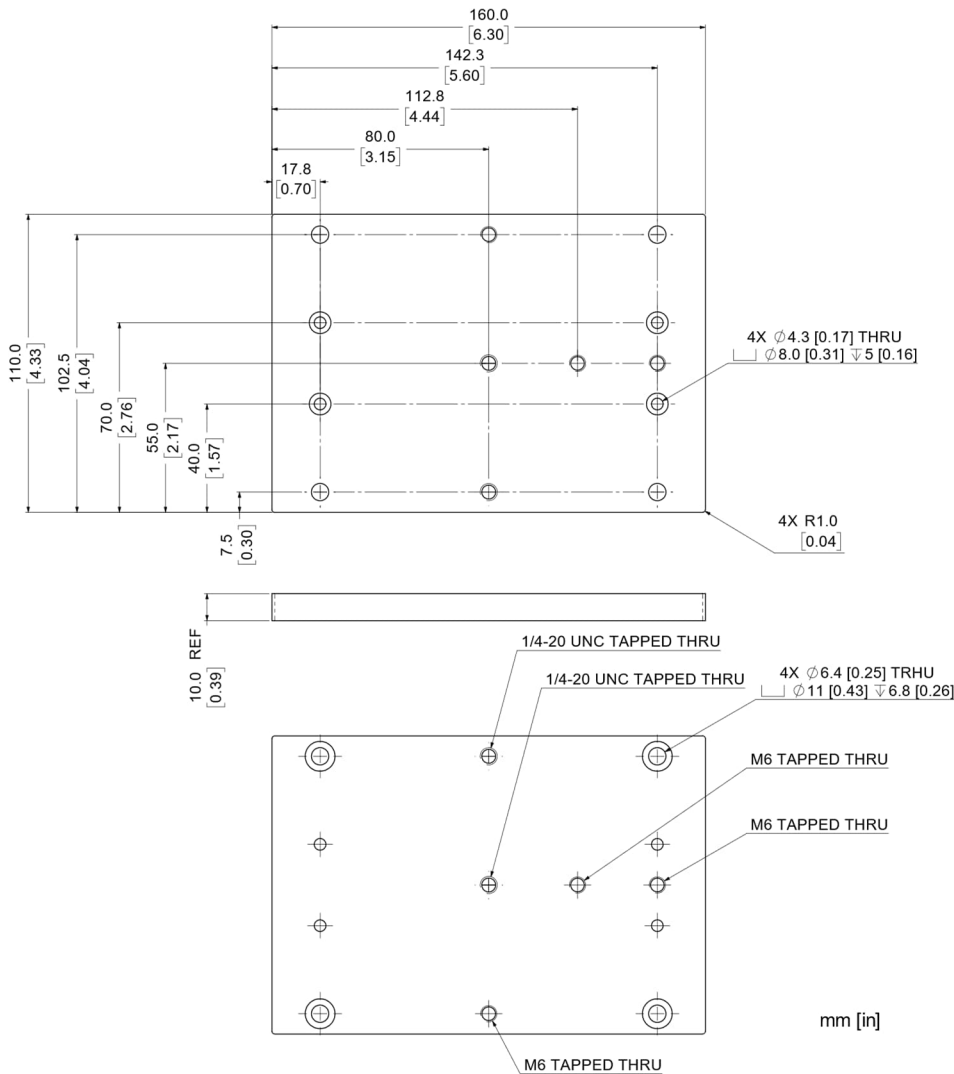


Figure 8-11: Assembling the Mounting Base

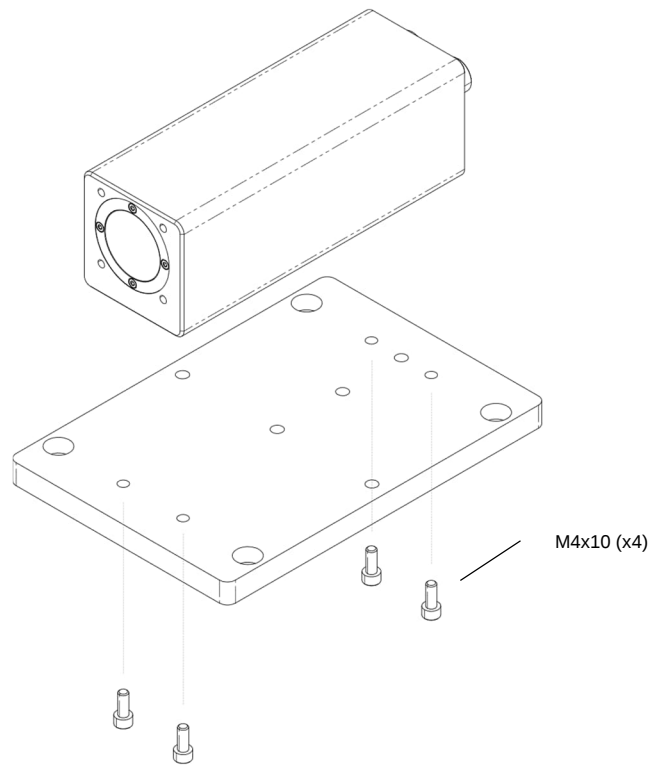
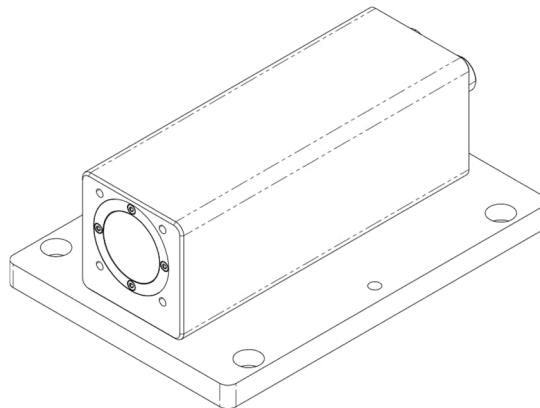


Figure 8-12: Camera with Mounting Base

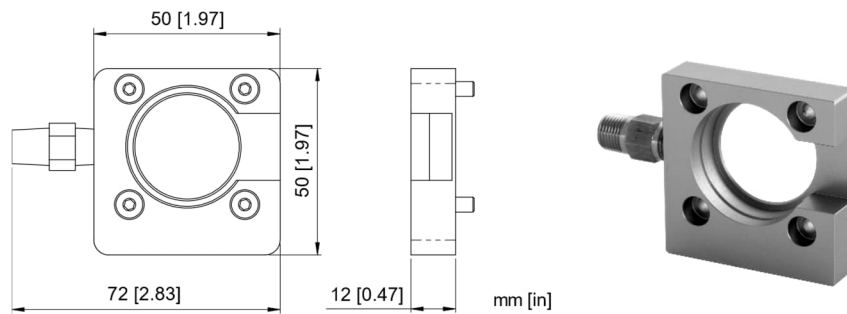


8.2.2 Air Purge Collar (A-TV30-AP)

The air purge collar is used to keep dust, moisture, airborne particles, and vapors away from the lens. Air flows into the 1/8" NPT fitting and out the front aperture. Clean filtered (or "instrument") air is recommended to avoid contaminants from settling on the lens. Do not use chilled air below 10°C (50°F).

Figure 8-14: Assembling the Air Purge Collar

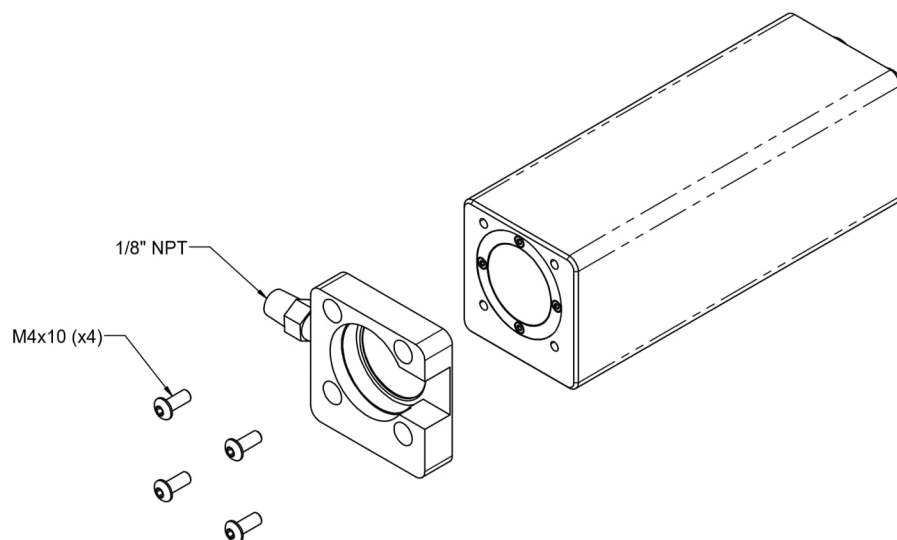


Figure 8-15: Camera with Air Purge Collar and Mounting Base



8.2.3 Water Cooling Enclosure (A-TV30-AP-WC)

The water cooling enclosure allows the camera to be used in high ambient temperatures with water cooling. Water is supplied at the inlet IN, circulates in the housing walls, cools the unit, and exits at the outlet OUT. The connections are given via 1/8" NPT fittings.

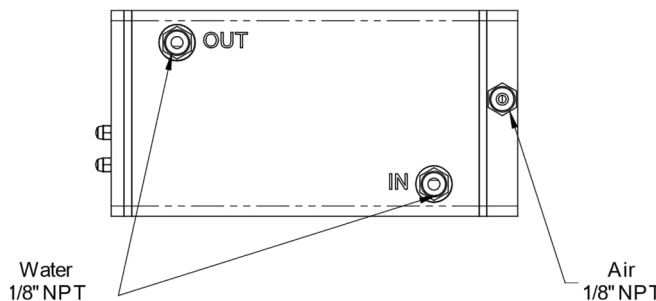
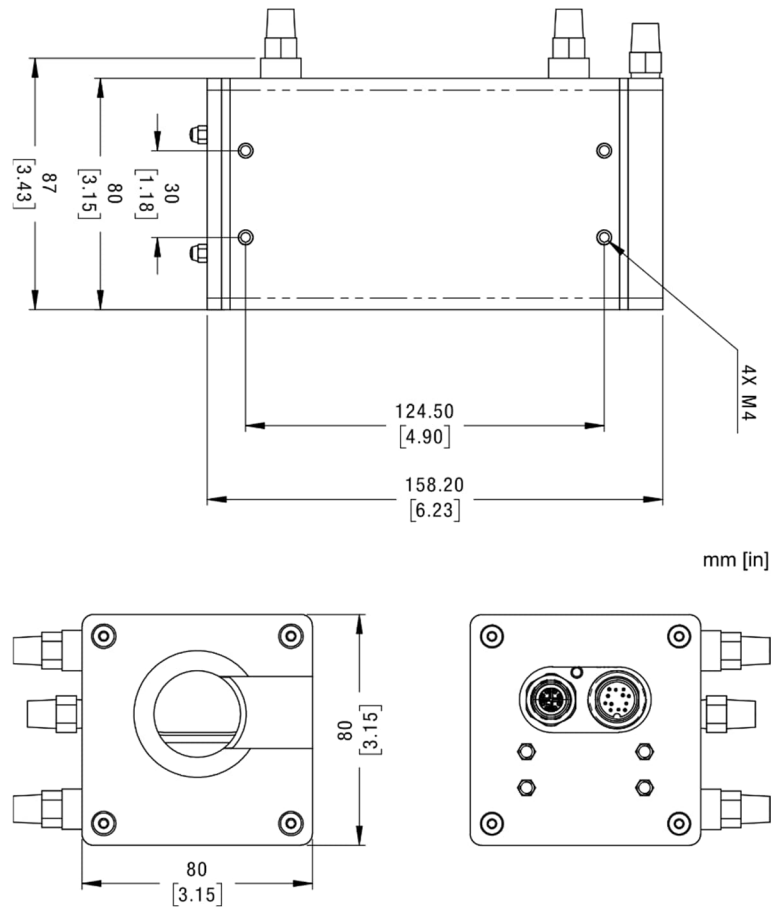
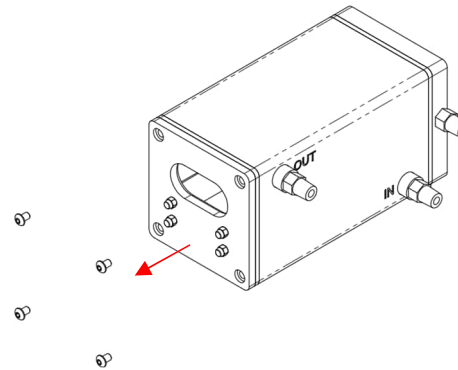


Figure 8-18: Enclosure Dimensions

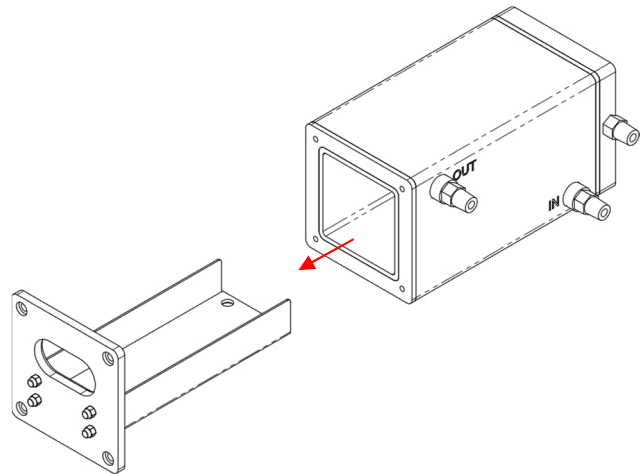

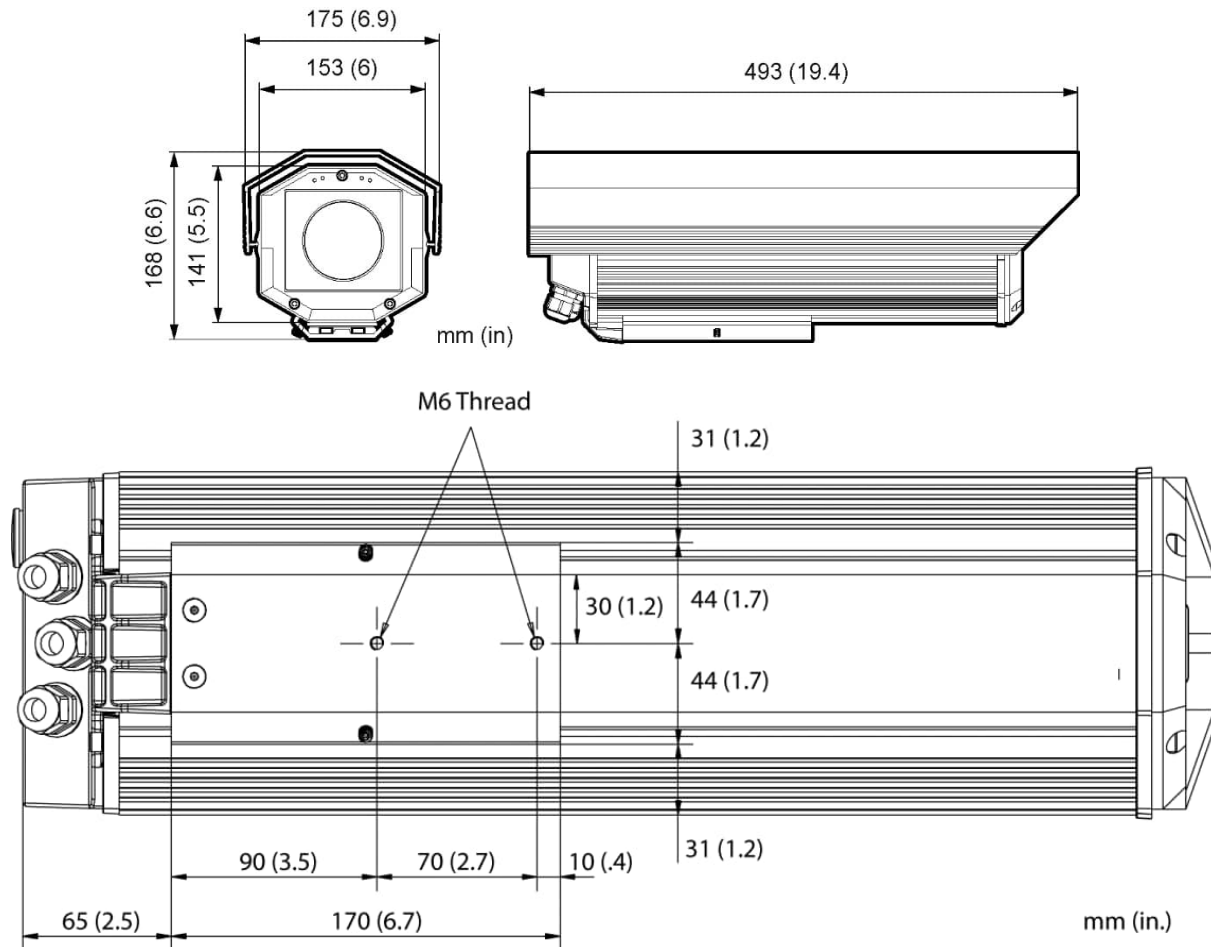

8.2.5 Swivel Bracket (A-BR-S)

The swivel bracket is to mount the camera in a moveable position, to correct in an easy way the pitch and yaw orientation. For a correct imager orientation, you can pitch ($0^{\circ} - 90^{\circ}$) and swivel ($0^{\circ} - 360^{\circ}$) the imager sighting axis. The base has a single control knob and a split-ball lock, to hold the specific head mount firmly in place.

Figure 8-22: Mounting Base to be fixed to the Mount Beam of Swivel Bracket

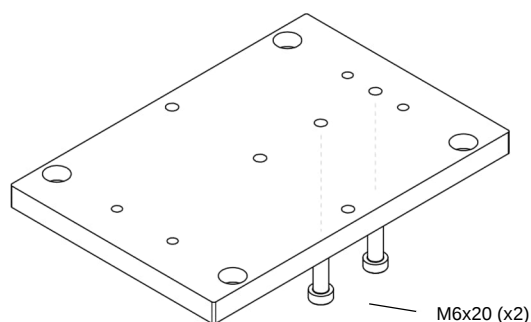
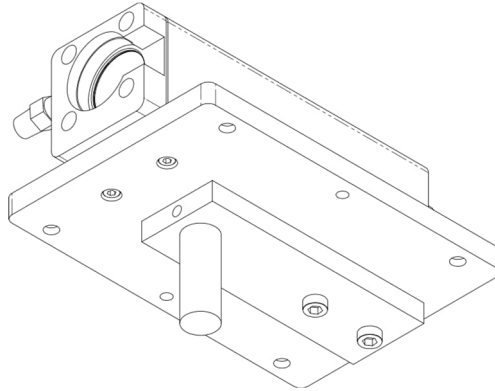


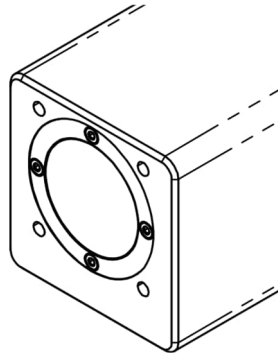
Figure 8-23: Camera with Swivel Bracket

9.1 Fail-Safe Operation

In cooperation with I/O capabilities, the camera provides a fail-safe system. That system is designed to alert the operator and provide a safe output in case of certain system failures.

The following system failures cause a fail-safe operation:

- Power supply is lost or out of range
- Internal temperature of the camera is out of range
- Firmware has crashed

When an error or failure does occur, all internal outputs of the camera adjust to a tristate level. A tristate level means that the output signal is neither logically 0 nor 1, but high impedance. Such a signal makes the camera behave as if its output is temporarily disconnected from the surrounding circuits.



Warning

The Fail-Safe circuit should never be relied on exclusively to protect critical processes. Other safety devices should also be used to supplement this function!

For automatic fail-safe monitoring, the user can make the following implementation:

- Electrically consider an Open-Drain implementation for the internal digital outputs of the camera, see section 5.7.3 [Digital Outputs](#), page 30
- Define a measurement condition that is always false and assign one internal digital output to that measurement condition, see section 7.2.2 [<Camera> <Conditions>](#), page 38.
Note: The considered output must be exclusive, that means no other condition can switch this output.
- Make sure that the considered output is non-inverted. Switch the output type to [<Open Drain>](#), see section 7.4.1 [</O> <Internal>](#), page 48.
- The considered output is now always on low signal as long as no fail-safe occurs. In case of a fail-safe the output goes to tri-state and the Open Drain implementation provides a high signal. This behavior can be permanently monitored by an external control system to indicate a fail-safe condition.

9.2 Troubleshooting

9.3 Cleaning the Window

Always keep the window clean. Care should be taken when cleaning the window. To clean the window, do the following:

1. Lightly blow off loose particles with “canned” air (used for cleaning computer equipment) or a small squeeze bellows (used for cleaning camera lenses).
2. Gently brush off any remaining particles with a soft camel hair brush or a soft lens tissue (available from camera supply stores).
3. Clean remaining “dirt” using a cotton swab or soft lens tissue dampened in distilled water. Do not scratch the surface.

For fingerprints or other grease, use any of the following:

- Denatured alcohol
- Ethanol
- Kodak lens cleaner

Apply one of the above to the window. Wipe gently with a soft, clean cloth until you see colors on the surface, then allow to air dry. Do not wipe the surface dry, as this may scratch the surface.

If silicones (used in hand creams) get on the window, gently wipe the surface with Hexane. Allow to air dry.

Note

Do not use any ammonia or any cleaners containing ammonia to clean the lens. This may result in permanent damage to the window's surface!

9.4 Re-Calibration

A re-calibration is performed to determine and set the parameters affecting an instrument's performance in order to ensure its designed accuracy within prescribed limits. Re-calibrations must be performed at regular intervals depending on the specific operating conditions of the sensor.

Note

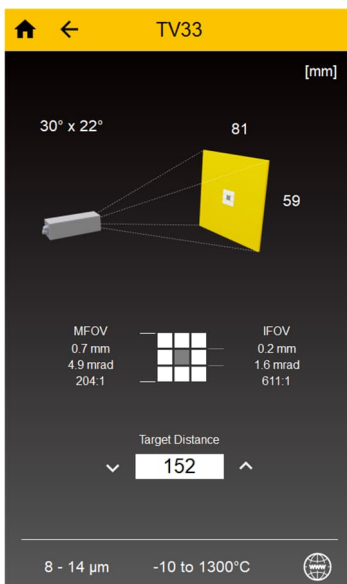
For onsite calibration, users are recommended to contact the Technical Support team to get further assistance on required calibration geometries and references.

10 Appendix

10.1 Field of View Calculator

It is important that the TV30 camera is mounted at a distance from the target, sufficient to be able to “see” the entire area of interest. For this reason, the manufacturer provides a field of view calculating software called “Spot Size Calculator”, which allows the calculation of the thermal image size (Field of View FOV) and the pixel size (Instantaneous Field of View IFOV) for a given lens, based on a specific camera mounting distance.

10.2 Avoidance of Condensation

If environmental conditions make water cooling necessary, it is strictly recommended to check whether condensation will be a real problem or not. Water-cooling also causes a cooling of the air in the inner part of the sensor, thereby decreasing the capability of the air to hold water. The relative humidity increases and can reach 100% very quickly. In case of a further cooling, the surplus water vapor will condense out as water. The water will condense on the lenses and the electronics, resulting in possible damage to the sensor. Condensation can even happen on an IP67 sealed housing.

Note

There is no warranty repair possible in case of condensation within the housing!

To avoid condensation, the temperature of the cooling media and the flow rate must be selected to ensure a minimum device temperature. The minimum sensor temperature depends on the ambient temperature and the relative humidity. Please consider the following table.

10.3 Determination of Emissivity

Emissivity is a measure of an object's ability to absorb and emit infrared energy. It can have a value between 0 and 1.0. For example, a mirror has an emissivity of < 0.1 , while the so-called *blackbody* reaches an emissivity value of 1.0. If a higher than actual emissivity value is set, the output will read low, provided the target temperature is above its ambient temperature. For example, if you have set 0.95 and the actual emissivity is 0.9, the temperature reading will be lower than the true temperature.

An object's emissivity can be determined by one of the following methods:

- Determine the actual temperature of the material using an RTD (PT100), a thermocouple, or any other suitable contact temperature method. Next, measure the object's temperature and adjust emissivity setting until the correct temperature value is reached. This is the correct emissivity for the measured material.
- For relatively low temperatures (up to 260°C / 500°F) place a plastic sticker on the object to be measured. This sticker should be large enough to cover the target spot. Next, measure the sticker's temperature using an emissivity setting of 0.95. Finally, measure the temperature of an adjacent area on the object and adjust the emissivity setting until the same temperature is reached. This is the correct emissivity for the measured material.
- If possible, apply flat black paint to a portion of the surface of the object. The emissivity of the paint is 0.95. Next, measure the temperature of the painted area using an emissivity setting of 0.95. Finally, measure the temperature of an adjacent area on the object and adjust the emissivity until the same temperature is reached. This is the correct emissivity for the measured material.

10.4 Typical Emissivity Values

The following table provides a brief reference guide for determining emissivity and can be used when one of the above methods is not practical. Emissivity values shown in the table are only approximate, since several parameters may affect the emissivity of a material. These include the following:

- Temperature
- Angle of measurement
- Geometry (plane, concave, convex)
- Thickness
- Surface quality (polished, rough, oxidized, sandblasted)
- Spectral range of measurement
- Transmission (e.g. thin films plastics)

To optimize surface temperature measurements, consider the following guidelines:

- Determine the object's emissivity using the instrument, which is also to be used for temperature measurements.
- Avoid reflections by shielding the object from surrounding temperature sources.
- For higher temperature objects, use instruments with the shortest wavelength possible.
- For translucent materials such as plastic foils or glass, ensure that the background is uniform and lower in temperature than the object.
- Mount the instrument perpendicular to the surface, if possible. In all cases, do not exceed angles more than 30° from incidence.
